


Bigger and Better **Alabama Archives Welcomes 2006 AAH Annual Meeting**

After a year's hiatus, the **Alabama Association of Historians (AAH) Annual Meeting** will be back on track on **February 3 - 4, 2006** when it will be hosted by the **Alabama Department of Archives and History (ADAH)** in Montgomery. The welcoming reception, evening dinner, and all sessions have been scheduled at ADAH, with tours of the newly completed Edwin C. Bridges wing available.

Keynote speaker following the banquet on Friday night will be **Taylor Branch**, a nationally-acclaimed, Pulitzer Prize-winning author on the American civil rights movement. Branch has dedicated more than 15 years to the first two volumes in the King trilogy, *Parting the Waters: America in the King Years 1954-63*, and *Pillar of Fire: America in the King Years 1963-65*. The third and final volume, *At Canaan's Edge: America in the King Years 1965-1968*, is due out in January 2006 and Branch's visit to Montgomery is part of a national book tour.



Taylor Branch

Three interesting and informative programs are planned for Friday afternoon's Pathways of Alabama History session. We will learn about the History of the Central Plank Toll Road as presented by Phil Koerper. Paul Beezley will speak on the Funerals of Jefferson Davis including the procession to Montgomery and his laying in state in the Alabama Capitol. **Gwen Patton** will provide an update on the Selma to Montgomery National Historic Trail.



The Alabama Department of Archives and History in Montgomery will host this year's AAH Annual Meeting.

Saturday's opening session will deal with outreach programs that bring history to the people. **Frances Robb** will examine the usefulness of photo exhibits to inform the public about historic events. Peter Branum will demonstrate how his museum uses educational trunks to reach out to schools and other groups. The session will conclude with George Ewert speaking about his local history radio program which is broadcast over PBS in the Mobile area.

The final session on Latin America expands the content of our program to include topics from other regions of the world. Pamela Murray will discuss her research on Manuela Sáenz, Simón Bolívar's confidante and mistress. **Larry Clayton** will provide unique views of Castro's Cuba and also translate a presentation by Salvador Larrúa Guedes, the foremost historian of the Church in Cuba and a recent exile of the Castro regime. **George Lauderbaugh** will provide a history of the Alabama Guatemala Partners, a program implemented in the mid-1960s as part of the Alliance for Progress.

All sessions will be held in the Alabama Archives building and parking is available directly across the street on Adams Avenue. Accommodation information is included on the enclosed 2006 AAH Annual Meeting Registration Form. ■

AAH Constitution

Notice of Resolutions

Incorporation & Tax-Exempt Status

As required by our Constitution, Article IX, Section B, I hereby submit these resolutions for our consideration at the Annual Business Meeting to be held February 4, 2006.

Resolution 1: RESOLVED that the Membership instructs the Executive Council to pursue legal Incorporation of the Alabama Association of Historians as a not-for-profit corporation in the State of Alabama, and to pursue tax-exempt status for the Association with the United States Internal Revenue Service.

[COMMENT on Resolution 1: Voting YES on this resolution allows/requires the Executive Council to file appropriate documents to incorporate AAH and seek tax-exempt status from the IRS.]

Resolution 2: RESOLVED that the Constitution and By-Laws of the Alabama Association of Historians be altered as herein proposed (see Proposed Constitutional Changes below); that the Executive Council be empowered to appoint a Designated Agent and to file incorporation papers in the County of its choosing; and that the newly adopted Constitution and By-Laws be filed as the Articles of Incorporation as required by law.

[COMMENT on Resolution 2: This is a 3-part resolution. The first clause adopts the changes in the Constitution needed for it to become the AAH corporate charter. The second empowers the Executive Council to appoint the legally-required designated agent (someone who represents the AAH to the state and can accept legal paperwork on the AAH's behalf) without having to come before the membership a second time. The second clause also allows the Executive Council to file appropriate paperwork through the Probate Court of whichever County is the home of the Designated Agent. The third clause ensures that the constitution will be the corporate charter without change except those required to specify a Designated Agent and City and County of Filing.]

Resolution 3: RESOLVED that the Membership instructs the Executive Council to expend funds up to a total of \$500 in payment of necessary fees for incorporating the AAH and securing its tax-exempt status. FURTHER RESOLVED that the Executive Council solicit voluntary funds from the membership and other sources to help pay for the costs of incorporation and gaining tax-exempt status; and that any funds collected in excess of the total required to pay such filing fees be delivered to the General Fund of the AAH.

[COMMENT on Resolution 3: This is pretty straightforward. There are fees associated with these legal filings-\$20 to the Alabama Secretary of State, \$30-40 to the Probate Court, and \$150 to the IRS. There might be other charges of which we are not aware in this cost estimate, so the resolution allows us to pay all such fees up to \$500. The second part allows the AAH to ask for donations to help offset these costs and tells us to turn over any left over monies to the AAH general fund.] ■

Proposed Constitutional Changes

February 2006

[N.B.: Strike-throughs indicate removed sections, **bold** indicates added language. For brevity's sake, only those portions affected by changes are reproduced.]

ARTICLE I: NAME AND PURPOSE

Sec. A. The name of this organization shall be "The Alabama Association of Historians."

Sec. B. The purpose of the Association is to establish closer relations among all persons and institutions interested in promoting the study of history and to stimulate and improve the work of historians in research, service, and teaching at all levels within the State of Alabama.

Sec. B. The principal office of the Association shall be located in the city of _____, county of _____, but the Association may establish other places of business and other offices elsewhere within the State of Alabama.

Sec. C. The name and address of the designated agent of the Association is _____.

ARTICLE II: PURPOSE

The purpose of the Association is to transact any and all lawful business for which nonprofit corporations may be incorporated under the laws of the State of Alabama, as amended, specifically:

To establish closer relations among all persons and institutions interested in the study of history and,

To stimulate and improve the research, service, and teaching conducted by historians at all levels and in all fields of history within the State of Alabama.

Meet Your AAH Executive Council

In an effort to better acquaint AAH members with their officers and council representatives, the last issue of the newsletter introduced three new members appointed to the AAH Executive Council in 2005. This issue features the remaining members, all of which are close to completing their 2004-06 terms. Following is a short biography of each.

Marty Olliff, President

Martin T. (Marty) Olliff, III, (photo on page 2) grew up in Huntsville, Alabama. He received a B.S. in Social Science Secondary Education from Auburn University in 1976 and an M.A. in European History in 1979. After moving to Oregon for a time where he worked as a printer, a cook, and a chef, he returned to Auburn in 1992 and in 1998 completed his Ph.D. in American History.

Marty served as graduate teaching assistant at AU and as editorial assistant for the *Alabama Review*. After several adjunct instructor jobs, Marty became Assistant Archivist at the Auburn University Archives from 1996 to 2001. He is now Director of the Archives of Wiregrass History and Culture and was awarded tenure and promotion to Associate Professor of History at Troy University Dothan in August 2005.

In addition to being President of the AAH, Marty serves on the boards of the Alabama Historical Association, the Alabama Humanities Foundation, the Historic Chattahoochee Commission, and the Dothan Landmarks Foundation. He is also on the editorial board of both the *Alabama Review* and *Provenance: The Journal of the Society of Georgia Archivists*.

Larry McQuiston, K-12 Teachers Representative

Larry D. McQuiston (photo unavailable) earned his B.A. in History and Political Science from Samford University, and his Masters in Education and his Administrative Certification from Troy State University. He has a total of ten years of teaching experience at Valley High School in Chambers County and Smiths Station High School in Lee County. He was principal of Wedowee Middle School in Randolph County for two years and is currently assistant principal of Central High School in Phenix City. Larry has been a member of AAH since 1990.

Mary Hubbard, President - Elect

Mary Hubbard, a native of St. Louis, Missouri, graduated from Washington University in 1965. Except for two years working as a newspaper reporter in Shreveport, Louisiana, Mary's professional life has been devoted to teaching. After moving to Alabama in 1980 with her husband Michael, a

native of the state, and obtaining her master's degree in gifted education, she subsequently taught at the Jefferson County Resource Learning Center for the Gifted, the Jefferson County International Baccalaureate School, and Mountain Brook High School. For the past four years, she has been teaching history at the Alabama School of Fine Arts.

In 2000, President Clinton appointed Mary to serve as a council member for the National Endowment for the Humanities. That same year she also received the Alabama Association of Historians biennial Teacher of the Year Award. She currently serves as a member of the board of the Alabama Humanities Foundation.

Sam Covington, Junior College Representative

Sam Covington earned his B.A. and M.A. from Auburn University, and is now a history instructor at Enterprise-Ozark Community College where he teaches primarily Western Civilization. Sam was named outstanding Academic Faculty Member for 2002-2003 and was also his college's 2004 nominee for the Alabama College Association's Chancellor's Award in the academic faculty category.

In addition to his teaching responsibilities, Sam has been actively involved in EOCC's SACS re-accreditation process and has played a leading role in the development of his college's distance education program. He is also a member of the Alabama Education Association and the Alabama Historical Association. ■

Mae Ellis Flynt Award Nominations Sought

Children's Walk to Commemorate Boycott

The city of Montgomery will host school children from Montgomery, Birmingham, Atlanta, and surrounding areas on December 1 as they march through downtown Montgomery to commemorate the bus boycott that began with the arrest of Rosa Parks on that day 50 years ago. The Montgomery Children's Walk will start at the Rosa Parks Museum and Library, near the spot where Parks' historic arrest occurred, and proceed up Dexter Avenue to the Capitol steps. There the students will participate in a commemoration ceremony before being brought back to school. The Montgomery Police Department will provide traffic control and security.

Teaching packets designed to help teachers prepare students for the celebration were sent to area schools. Response to the event has been good with several public and private schools signing up students. Organizers of the event anticipate between 3,000 and 5,000 participants. The march will launch a year-long commemoration of the boycott.

Rosa Parks, who will be a major focus of the day's events, died October 24 at the age of 92.

Papers Presented

Mary Stanton presented a paper about the life and work of Sam Shirah at the Southern Historical Association Conference in Atlanta on November 3, 2005. Mary was part of a three-person panel discussing "Forgotten Activists." Shirah was a white activist who worked with SNCC, SSOC, and SCEF during the 1960's.

Mary also presented "At One with the Majority Viewpoint" at the Southern Jewish Historical Society's annual meeting in Baltimore on November 5. It dealt with the Jewish community of Montgomery and its response to the Bus Boycott of 1955-56. ■

A Primary Source

Gwen Patton is generously quoted as a primary source in *Peace and Freedom: The Civil Rights and Anti-War Movements in the 1960's* by British historian Simon Hall. The book is published by University of Pennsylvania Press.

Gwen is the archivist at Trenholm State Technical College; serves as coordinator for the Montgomery Friends of the Historic Voting Rights Trail; and is on its National Advisory Council. Because of her direct involvement in the Civil Rights Movement, Gwen is frequently sought as a primary source for publications, and radio and television documentaries. ■

Educator's Commitment

Sarah L. Hendrix attended the dedication of the new Civil Rights Memorial Center in Montgomery, Alabama on Sunday, October 23, 2005. She was there to pay tribute to the martyrs who gave their lives in the cause of civil rights and to have her name added to the Wall of Tolerance.

As an educator, Sarah contributed to the making of *Mighty Times: The Legacy of Rosa Parks*, a short film included in a teaching kit that was sent free of charge to many schools. Her efforts earned her a place in the credits that appear at the end of the film.

Sarah has been a member of the Southern Poverty Law Center since 2000 and has steadfastly supported their work in teaching tolerance and opposing hate groups throughout the world. ■

News on Alabama Campuses

Auburn University

Dr. Wayne Flynt retired at the end of September 2005 as Distinguished University Professor after serving on the Auburn faculty for 28 years. Wayne promises us he will stay active in the wider Alabama community and will keep up his ambitious research and writing program.

Auburn's History Department welcomed two new members to its faculty for the 2005-2006 academic year:

Charles Israel is an associate professor with a Ph.D. from Rice University. He specializes in the history of religion and social reform in the South. He published *Before Scopes: Evangelicals, Education, and Evolution in Tennessee, 1870-1925* with the University of Georgia Press (2004). Although Charles will focus his teaching efforts on the New South, he will also teach Alabama history as needed.

Joseph Turrini is an assistant professor, specializing in archival studies with special interest in the histories of labor, sports, and technology. He earned his Ph.D. from Wayne State University in 2004 and has worked as an archivist at the Catholic University of America in Washington. He has published numerous articles and is in the process of revising his dissertation, a history of track and field in the United States, for publication.

Rafe Blaufarb's book, *Bonapartists in the Borderlands: French Exiles and Refugees on the Gulf Coast, 1815-1835*, which focuses on Alabama's Vine and Olive Community, will appear with the University of Alabama Press in January 2006.

Kathryn Braund completed her project for the Horseshoe Bend National Military Park on towns and tribal divisions in the Creek Confederacy in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. She also participated last summer, along with **Ken Noe**, **David Carter**, and Ruth Crocker, in the Teaching American History program with the Auburn and Opelika city schools.

David Carter was awarded tenure and promotion to Associate Professor last spring. In addition to completing revisions to his book manuscript on civil rights during the Johnson administration, David made a presentation on civil rights history in an Alabama Humanities Foun-

Jacksonville State University

Russel Lemmons, Professor of History, presented a paper titled "'Imprisoned, Murdered, Besmirched': The Controversy Concerning Berlin's Ernst Thalmann Monument and German National Identity, 1990-1995," at the annual meeting of the European Section of the Southern Historical Association.

Harvey H. Jackson, Professor of History, spoke on "Remembering the Great Depression" at the Writing Our Lives series sponsored by Sylacauga's Comer Library and the Alabama Humanities Foundation and on "From Court House to Putin' House: Political Folklore in Clarke County Alabama" at the annual meeting of the Alabama Folklife Association. He was featured on "Bookmarks" on Alabama Public Television. He continues to serve on the editorial board of the *Anniston Star* and write a weekly column on southern politics and culture.

Phillip Koerper, Professor of History, serves on the Board of Directors of the Alabama Archaeological Society and is President of the Coosa Valley Chapter of the group. He is also co-chair of the Anthropology section of the Alabama Academy of Science.

Donald Prudlo, Assistant Professor of History, was awarded an honorarium to attend the Liberty Fund Conference on "Liberty and Voluntary Death" which was held in Portland, Oregon. ■

Troy University Montgomery

Fred Beatty assumed the chairmanship of the Department of History and Social Sciences following the retirement of **Drew Harrington** in June.

Dan Puckett, a graduate of the University of West Alabama and Mississippi State University, has joined the full-time faculty and assumed academic duties this past summer focusing on European history. ■

News on Alabama Campuses

Troy University Dothan

Priscilla McArthur retired from the History Department of Troy University Dothan on August 1, 2005. A graduate of Florida State University, Priscilla joined the Troy-Dothan faculty in 1982 to teach Russian and European history. She rose to the position of Department Chair, and retired as Interim Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Marty Olliff received tenure and promotion to Associate Professor of History on August 1, 2005.

Troy Now One

On August 1, 2005, Troy State University changed its name and reintegrated its four Alabama campuses into one centralized administrative unit. Now known simply as Troy University, the change features simplified course articulation and a single SACS accreditation making Troy the second-largest university in the state.

Troy University began in 1887 as the State Normal School Troy (teachers' college with a two-year curriculum). In 1893 it changed its name to Troy State Normal College, until 1929 when it was moved to its present campus, and changed to Troy State Teachers College.

In the 1950s, the school's programs at Maxwell AFB and Ft. Rucker blossomed into their own campuses and in 1967 a branch was established in Phenix City. Troy State Montgomery and Troy State Dothan achieved separate SACS accreditations in the 1980s, but by 2000 the move was on to merge all of the campuses into a single university to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

Troy University serves 27,000 students in Alabama, as well as 17 other states and 11 other nations across 13 time zones. Troy documents over 100,000 alumni world-wide. ■

Wallace State University

Robert S. Davis, has published an article on the history of the Kettle Creek battlefield in the *Journal of the Georgia Association of Historians*; an article on the Cherokee Indian court cases in *Journal of Southern Legal History*; and a piece on memoirs misidentified as diaries, and other false literary representations, in *Documentary Editing*. ■

University of Alabama

Paul Hagenloh received a post-doctoral fellowship for the 2004-05 academic year. He was a Kennan Fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington D.C. He is currently completing revisions to his book manuscript, "Police, Crime, and Public Order in Stalin's Russia, 1928-1940."

Kate Haulman received a National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship for \$37,000 which supported her during a five-month stay at the Winterthur Museum and Library in Delaware. She is currently working on a book manuscript, entitled "Political Modes: The Politics of Fashion in Eighteenth-Century America."

Damon Freeman was a National Institute for Mental Health fellow at the Institute for Health, Health Care Policy, and Aging Research at Rutgers University in Camden, New Jersey. He spent the year developing his dissertation on psychologist and Civil Rights pioneer Kenneth Clark.

Greg Dorr has been awarded a \$40,000 Post-Doctoral Fellowship at the Center for the Study of Diversity in Science, Medicine, and Technology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Joshua Rothman has been awarded a \$40,000 grant from the American Antiquarian Society and the National Endowment for the Humanities to continue his current work, "Slavery and Speculation in the Flush Times: The Heart of Jacksonian America." ■

University of Montevallo

Wilson Fallin's manuscript, "Uplifting the People: Black Baptists in Alabama, 1721-2000," has been accepted by the University of Alabama Press with projected publication in 2007. Fallin also contributed an essay entitled "Black Baptist Leaders: The Progressive Era and World War I" for the upcoming publication of *Alabama and World War I*.

Robert Barone is working on a book-length manuscript on the life of 16th-century English mathematician and astronomer, John Dee.

Ruth Truss completed an article on the Alabama National Guard for the on-line Encyclopedia of Alabama.

Jim Day submitted an article on Alabama's convict-lease system to the *Gulf South Historical Review* with publication slated for spring 2006. ■

ARTICLE XI: TAX EXEMPT STATUS

No part of the net earnings of the Association shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, officers, Executive Council, or other private persons, except to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article II. No substantial part of the activities of the Association shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Association shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf or in opposition to any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Association shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding sections of any future federal tax code, or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170(c)(2) of the IRC or its successors.

ARTICLE XII: DISSOLUTION

Sec. A. The Association exists in perpetuity unless earlier dissolved by the same procedure for amending this constitution.

Sec. B. Upon dissolution of the Association, assets shall be distributed for one or more exempt purposes within the meaning of IRC Section 501(c)(3) or its successors, or shall be distributed to the federal, state, or local government, for a public purpose. Any assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by a court of competent jurisdiction of the county in which the principal office of the Association is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization(s) as such court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.
