Bill would allow 2-year college students to transfer, receive degrees

Special to the Times-Journal A bill currently in the state Legislature would allow two-year college students to transfer early to four-year colleges and still receive their associate degrees from the two-year schools.

This idea, called a reverse transfer, would allow a student who decides to leave a two-year state college early and go to a four-year state college to still receive his associate degree after completing 60 credit hours.

"I like the idea of reverse transfer, and we have these agreements with several universities already," said Joe Burke, vice president and dean of instruction at Northeast Alabama Community College in Rainsville. "The national effort to increase the number of college degree recipients,

called the college completion agenda, is complemented by the reverse-transfer idea.

"Research indicates that if a student completes an associate's degree, he or she will more likely complete a bachelor's degree. This potentially is a win-win-win situation for the two-year college, the four-year college, and, more importantly, for the student. The colleges will increase their completion numbers, and students will benefit by having college degrees.'

Senate Bill 77, sponsored by Sen. Gerald Dial, R-Lineville, passed the Senate Committee on Education and Youth Affairs 6-0 on March 18, and was referred to the house committee on Education Policy on March, 31st. The state-run Articulation and General Studies Committee would notify

the transfer student when he or she has accumulated 60 semester hour credits, and also notify the twoyear college from which the student transferred, so that the two-year college could send the associate degree to the student through the mail.

Rep. Nathaniel Ledbetter, R-Rainsville, said although he hasn't read the entire bill, "anything I can do to promote higher education, I am for.'

"Northeast brings so much to this area, with recognition this area of the state receives, the education they provide, as well as economically,' Ledbetter said.

working toward something and they receive a pat on the back - like receiving an associate degree in the mail would do - that would foster encouragement to complete the four-year degree."

Northeast Alabama Community College now has reverse-transfer agree ments with Jacksonville State University, Athens State University and the University of Alabama in Huntsville, as well as two private colleges, Huntingdon College and Bryan College.

The bill currently in the Legislature would make possible reverse transfer agreements with all in state public colleges. Troy University journalism student Will Reinert of Fort Payne wrote this story as part of a project partly funded by the Alabama Press Association Journalism Foundation.
